IMPROVEMENTS ON THE COLUMBINE TRAIL

South Suburban Parks and Recreation District is planning to replace two sections of the existing asphalt on the Columbine Trail. The sections are located between Normandy Parkway and Fremont Avenue and between Fremont Avenue and Hinsdale Circle. The new trail will still be asphalt. The repair work is scheduled to be done within the next two months weather permitting.

GARDNER'S CORNER

Now is the time to complete some gardening chores that will pay big benefits to your landscape. Even though we may have some short bursts of winter remaining, the soil is warming due to greater solar radiation and some plants are beginning to show bud expansion. It is this warming of the soil that initiates spring growth.

Some of the more critical and effective things to do at this time include:

- <u>Spray for scale and other latent insects.</u> Use dormant oil spray now, before buds break to smother scale and insect eggs. This will eliminate scale on aspen and other insect eggs that hatch later as foliage appears and the temperatures rise.
- <u>Prune crabapples and other plants subject to fire blight.</u> Fire blight is a bacterial disease that can easily kill members of the rose family after spreading by bees during bloom periods. Pruning now avoids spreading the disease by pruning with infected equipment.
- <u>Prune other plants.</u> Without leaves, it is easier to identify those limbs and twigs that need to be removed because they are dead, out of place, crossing, or otherwise overlay competing. Some trees do not leak sap as much this time of year and heal better during spring growth.
- <u>Plan for annual flower placement</u>. Evaluate what was right or wrong with last year's plantings or choose a spot for new plants. Pick plants from the garden center while the selection is good and you have a chance to acclimate them to outdoor conditions.
- <u>Lawn fertilize</u>. For those who did not do the recommended fall fertilizing, now is a good time to apply a good dose of all-purpose lawn fertilizer at the rate of ³/₄ - 1 pound of available nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of area. It is still a little early to apply fertilizers with herbicides and preemergent controls.
- <u>Plant cool season grasses.</u> Some, like bluegrass, are already beginning to grow and this is the ideal time to establish seeded areas without the need for excessive irrigation. Prepare the soil well (4-6" cultivation, soil amendment) and lightly mulch after seeding with peat moss or straw. Spring rains and snow will only help establish the seed or sod.
- <u>Early vegetable planting.</u> Cultivate the garden spot and sow seeds of cool season crops, including:
 - carrots

- bok choi

- spinach
- peas - kale

- green onions
- leeks

lettuce
radishes

- beets

If you have not had a soil test recently, gather a sample and send to a lab for testing or use a soil testing kit.

<u>Clean up perennial beds.</u> Remove debris and dead foliage and divide plants as needed. If transplanting, prepare the soil well with 50% soil and 50% manure or compost. Many perennials will bloom very well after <u>early</u> spring transplanting. Replenish mulches as needed and water plants in hot, dry areas.
